

## Mission Moment From Clinic Director

"HH" is a Hispanic patient of the Moore Free Care Clinic who does not speak English and has no legal residence in the U.S. He lives in a trailer behind a church with no running water or electricity. This man has diabetes type 2 and a non-healing foot ulcer. He was referred to the MFCC by the hospitalists who cared for him during an admission period at Moore Regional Hospital. He was kept in the hospital for weeks after amputation of some toes because he was afraid to return to his home where he reported having rats that were biting on his foot wound. He was in and out of the hospital several times before he was able to keep a clinic appointment. The case managers at Healthnet were vigilant in ensuring the patient had his medications and any other pertinent supplies during the interim.

Eventually, the patient was seen by the hospitalists at the clinic and taken care of by their supervising physician, Dr. Dan Barnes. Dr. Barnes was



## Patient Navigation Program

We are excited to announce the MFCC Patient Navigation Program to be guided by Mary Corry, RN. Dr Harold P. Freeman, founder and national champion of patient navigation, established the nation's first Patient Navigation Program in 1990 at Harlem Hospital Center to help improve access to screening and address the delays in clinical followup and barriers to care that low income persons encounter.

What is Patient Navigation? Patient Navigation is a process by which an individual—a Patient Navigator—guides patients through and around barriers in the complex health care system to help ensure timely diagnosis and treatment. Barriers to quality care fall into a number of categories such as:

- -Financial and economic
- -Transportation
- -Language and cultural
- -Bias based on culture/race/age
- -Communication
- -Fear

-Health care system

Patient Navigation helps ensure that patients receive culturally competent care that is also confidential, respectful, compassionate and mindful of the patient's safety. The MFCC Patient Navigation Program will work with a broad spectrum of professionals to identify those patients currently in need. Secondly, program objectives will be identified with the goal of increasing patient adherence to recommended care initiatives. Patient Navigators will be needed to work with a core group of patients. A Patient Navigator essentially is a problem solver and a highly resourceful individual. A navigator can be a:

- -Trained health care professional (social worker, case manager, nurse, pharmacist, physician)
- -Lay individual who can coordinate the needed health care services

The Patient Navigator is trained to anticipate, address, and overcome barriers to care and to guide patients through the health care system. Patient Navigators can help improve the quality of care patients receive, and Patient Navigation Programs may help extend or even save patients' lives. The result is that patients have a greater chance of receiving a quick and timely diagnosis and any necessary treatments. In addition, services may be better coordinated and more consistent, resulting in improved outcomes. The MFCC welcomes trained health care professionals to become Patient Navigators.
